## Question: How many crocodiles were shot - not trapped and relocated - in 2009-10 and to date, 2010-11, and what happens to the carcasses

## Answer:

The majority of the problem crocodiles captured by the NT Government are kept alive and are transferred to a local crocodile farm.

Occasionally very large or very aggressive animals may be shot where harpooning and live capture is not possible, the risk to staff is too great or local police believe that the animal poses a serious threat to the public.

Where a problem crocodile is shot, the carcass is left to decay naturally.

Private contractors may undertake the removal of a 'problem' animal on private or pastoral land under an approved permit to take protected wildlife. These animals are either shot and skinned at a local crocodile farm or transported live to a crocodile farm if they have potential breeding use.
