

What is the Council of Territory Co-operation?

The Council of Territory Co-operation (CTC) is a committee of the Northern Territory Legislative Assembly. It was formed in 2009 and has been established to monitor and report to the Parliament on the progress of government policies and initiatives.

Initial matters referred by the Legislative Assembly are the Strategic Indigenous Housing and Infrastructure Program (SIHIP), local government reform and Working Future including growth towns and outstations.

The CTC is empowered to conduct inquiries and make recommendations on matters of public importance which are referred to it by the Legislative Assembly or self referred.

The committee has recently taken a strong focus on child protection and has been scrutinising government action in response to the Report of the Board of Inquiry into the Child Protection System.

English teacher, Lynne also worked
for many years in the mining industry

is an active member of her community
and prior to the 2008 NT election was an elected
member of Nhulunbuy Town Board.



Marion was the Labor Party Deputy Chief Minister of the Northern Territory from November 2007 until February 2009. She was the highest ranked Indigenous person in government in Australia's history. She was also the first Indigenous woman to be elected to the Northern Territory Parliament.
