In addition to the school resourcing, in 2018, an effective enrolment floor was introduced that provides additional funding to schools that had an effective enrolment of less than 50 per cent. Of the ten schools included in Table 1 above, half of these schools will benefit from the new effective enrolment floor, receiving an additional \$934 100 in funding for Semester 2, 2018 (refer Table 2 below). The funding will be linked to the delivery of specific school improvement initiatives over a period of time.
