Question: Can you outline any changes to the status of the goanna species that have

been observed in the Northern Territory over the past few years in relation

to the invasion of cane toads?

Answer: There are 16 reptiles species listed as

threatened in the Northern Territory including the marine turtle species. There are three goanna species listed as threatened or vulnerable in the NT. They are the floodplain monitor, the Mertens' water monitor and the

Mitchell's water monitor. These species declined in the Top End when cane toads invaded us. They preyed on and were poisoned by the toads. This

generally occurred from the early 1990s in the gulf region through to the 2000s

around Darwin.

However, monitoring shows these goannas persist at lower numbers, and experience from Queensland shows their population partly recover over time. They are also secure on a number

of islands with no cane toads.
