## Alcohol Management Plans

## 1. How many Alcohol Management Plans are currently in operation across the NT and where?

Alcohol Management Plans were an initiative of a previous Australian Government and in Alcohol Protected Areas developed in accordance with the Stronger Futures Northern Territory Act. They were statements of community intent and aspiration for reducing alcohol related harms. They ranged in length and complexity, and described community agreed strategies and proposals for action.

The following 35 communities have engaged in Alcohol Management Planning processes:

The remaining AMPs listed above have been signed at community level.

2. How many AMPs do you claim are awaiting approval from the Federal Government and for which communities or areas?

The Titjikala AMP is the only AMP that was approved by the Australian Government.

Alcohol Management Plans are no longer the tool used for communities to address alcohol related harms.

The previous Australian Government ceased approving AMPs and moved to supporting the development of Alcohol Action Initiatives for practical community led projects to reduce alcohol demand and harm.

The NT Government is now engaging with remote communities through Alcohol Action Initiatives (Department of Health) and Local Decision Making (Department of the Chief Minister).
