- 1. How many dentists are employed by the Department of Health and Community Services.
- 2. Where are the dentists based.
- 3. Are any dentist positions vacant; if so, how many vacancies are there and for how long have they been vacant.
- 4. What services are now conducted in schools following the adoption of the Estimates Review Committee's recommendations.
- Does the Department of Health and Community Services keep statistics detailing the services provided to schools; if so, what were the 1991 calendar year figures for the following -
 - (a) number of school enrolments;
 - (b) percentage of service cover;
 - (c) number of patient visits;
 - (d) number of second examinations; and
 - (e) number of completed treatments.
- 6. If the answer to question 5 is yes, what are the 1992 calendar year to date figures for the following -
 - (a) number of school enrolments;
 - (b) percentage of service cover;
 - (c) number of patient visits;
 - (d) number of second examinations; and

- (e) number of completed treatments.
- 7. What monitoring system is in place to check whether the Department of Health and Community Services' goals in the dental health area will be achieved and whether a reintroduction of the school service at increased levels needs to be set in place.
- 8. What monitoring process will take place on the effect of the closure of the Casuarina Dental Clinic.
- 9. What indicators would the Northern Territory government require to consider reopening the Casuarina Dental Clinic.

ANSWER

- 1. There are currently 19 full-time dentist positions.
- 2. There are 10 positions in Darwin, 5 in Alice Springs, 2 in Katherine and 2 in East Arnhem. In Tennant Creek the private practitioner is on contract to provide services to the department.
- 3. There are 3 positions currently vacant, 1 in Nhulunbuy and 2 in the Darwin Rural Services. The vacancy in Nhulunbuy has been filled intermittently by locums for 12 months, as has 1 Darwin position. The other Darwin position has been vacant for 3 months.
- 4. The ERC decision was not to wind back services in schools. Based on sound scientific evidence and following best practices elsewhere, it was decided to assess each child's risk status for dental disease and provide an individually appropriate recall period. Exactly the same services are available as previously. Each child who enrols in the Children's Dental Service is examined and all necessary general dental treatment is offered. Following parental consent, all necessary general treatment is provided.
- The Department of Health and Community Services keeps statistics detailing the services provide to school children. These statistics are printed in the Annual Report (p130 1991-92 report attached).

- 7. At dental examination, a routine epidemiological record of the disease status is prepared. This provides disease trends for all ages throughout the Territory. These trends are monitored annually at a local and Territory-wide level and are reported in the Annual Report.
- 8. Oral health throughout Australia is surveyed at intervals and disease trends can be monitored.

9. Casuarina Dental Clinic has been closed for over 15 months now. It could not be reopened without additional resources or displacing other services.
