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Thank you for the opportunity to speak...

Question: Why do we need to appoint an unelected official to override the NT's existing laws?

- 1. We do not. Rushing through major projects does little to improve the lives of Territorians and degrades life for many, whether it is no longer being able to afford a house because the big end of town has pushed the prices beyond anything sensible, or disappearing Natural environment and areas to enjoy.
- 2. No government is given a mandate to ride roughshod over existing laws because it doesn't suit them: there is a process for changing laws and it should be followed if we are to continue calling ourselves a democracy.

6. "It's the economy, stupid"....yes BUT there is no economy without environment. Tourism: Our two unique drawcards are pristine natural environment and Aboriginal culture. We are in danger of destroying both.

There are other ways of creating wealth and jobs: we need someone with imagination not the same tired ideas of raping the land and this will surely backfire.
