1. Economic Development and Infrastructure Program

That the Assembly:

- Acknowledges the outstanding work done by the private sector in developing a portfolio of projects valued at over \$57 billion spanning critical sectors such as minerals and resources digital innovation, renewable energy and agribusiness.
- Commends the 2024-25 Northern Territory's infrastructure program for its significant contributions to building a better Territory, fostering economic development, and improving the quality of life for all Territorians.

2. Family, Domestic and Sexual Violence

Notice given by: J Davis

Date: 26 November 2024

Status: To be moved:

That this Assembly:

1. Recognises that all members of this Assembly have firmly committed to addressing family and domestic and sexual violence (FDSV) as a priority.
2. Acknowledges that domestic, family and sexual violence is our true crime and safety crisis, and that this crisis disproportionately impacts Aboriginal women in the Northern Territory.
3. Recognises the findings of the "Coronial Inquests into the deaths of Kumarn Rabuntja, Kumanjayi Haywood, Miss Yunupingu and Ngeygo Ragurk', which highlight urgent reforms needed to protect Aboriginal women and children from domestic, family and sexual violence, and ensure victims are seen and heard;
4. Commits to fully resourcing and implementing all recommendations of the Coroner arising from these Inquests as a matter of urgency;
5. Further commits to working in partnership with Aboriginal communities and frontline services to ensure effective implementation of these reforms.

This Assembly stands united in addressing the domestic, family and sexual violence crime and safety crisis, and ensuring all women and children are safe, protected, and supported.

3. Gamba Grass

Status: To be moved:

That NT Legislative Assembly:

- Recognise that the invasive species Gamba Grass, through increased fire severity, threatens wildlife, infrastructure and lives in Litchfield National Park.
- Recognise the urgency of the problem and that without an adequately funded and planned response, Gamba will continue to spread in Litchfield National Park threatening the viability of the park as a tourist destination.
- Urges the government to implement the fully costed recommendations from the CDU research paper “The cost of not acting: Delaying invasive grass management increases costs and threatens assets in a national park, northern Australia” (Rossiter-Rachor et al., 2023), which include:
 - Expanding the eradication zone in the park to encompass the protection of 86% of visitor sites
 - Implement a five-year eradication program according to the investment recommendations in the report, followed by yearly ongoing maintenance
 - Install a full-time Gamba Coordinator to plan and carry out the eradication program.

4. Voluntary Assisted Dying

Status: To be moved:

That this Assembly:

- Acknowledge the important and extensive work of the Voluntary Assisted Dying Independent Expert Advisory Panel in producing the Report into Voluntary Assisted Dying in the Northern Territory.
- Recognise the right for Territorians to end their lives with dignity and the immense suffering that is caused for them and their families when this right is taken away from them.
- Recognise that the Northern Territory, the first jurisdiction in the world to legalise voluntary assisted dying, is now the last in Australia to pass this law.
- Urge the Government to implement the 22 recommendations of the Report into Voluntary Assisted Dying in the Northern Territory, acknowledging that many Territorians, from all political persuasions want the right to die with dignity in the Territory.

5. Select Committee on Pathways for Children and Young People

Status: To be moved:
That this Assembly:
1. Notes

- a. On 16 October 2024 the Deputy Chief Minister and Minister for Corrections moved the Criminal Code Amendment Bill 2024 be read for a second time, stating one purpose of the Bill was ensuring 10 and 11-year-old children who commit offences have "appropriate rehabilitation that will provide them an opportunity to turn their young lives around";
 - b. the vital responsibility that this Government owes to all children and young people in the Territory, including a responsibility under section 4(b) of the Youth Justice Act 2005 to ensure that young people who commit offences are "dealt with in a way that acknowledges [their] needs and will provide [them] with the opportunity to develop in socially responsible ways".
 - c. the vital responsibility that this Government owes to all Territorian children and young people, Police, Corrections Officers, Judges, and Justices; including a responsibility under sections 4(c) and 81(6) of the Youth Justice Act 2005 to provide them with appropriate alternatives to detention and imprisonment.
2. Establishes a Select Committee on Pathways for Children and Young People to inquire into and report on:
 - a. The alternatives to detention and imprisonment available to police, corrections officers, judges, and justices when dealing with 10- and 11-year-old offenders.
 - b. Additional pathways needed to help police, corrections officers, judges, and justices prevent reoffending and provide children with opportunities to make safer, more responsible choices with the support of meaningful and engaging programs.
 3. The committee will comprise 3 Government, 1 Opposition and 2 crossbench members to be nominated by the relevant whip or crossbench member to the Speaker in writing.
 4. The committee is to report by the first sitting day, 6 months after the passing of this motion.

6. Eradicating Racism

Status: To be moved:

That the Legislative Assembly:

1. Recognise the harm caused by all forms of racism across the Northern Territory, and
2. In line with the NT Aboriginal Justice Agreement and the recently announced National Anti-Racism Framework, urge this Government to adopt and resource all actions and recommendations of these documents that will work to eradicate racism in the Northern Territory.

7. Alcohol Action Plan for the Northern Territory

Notice given by: J Davis

Date: 12 February 2025

Status: To be moved:

That this Assembly:

calls on the Government to work with community representatives and sector experts to develop and implement a comprehensive, evidence-based alcohol action plan for the Northern Territory, which:

1. Addresses the widespread harms caused by alcohol and the root causes of these.
2. Includes strategies for prevention, harm reduction, early intervention, and support for those struggling with alcohol dependence.
3. Balances common sense measures that benefit the health and wellbeing of Territorians, based on what evidence suggests will be most likely to improve rates of harm.
4. Supports people to effectively break cycles of alcohol problems, complex social issues and involvement in the justice system, in ways that can have intergenerational benefits.
5. Recognises that there is not a one size fits all approach and ensures that local communities, particularly Aboriginal communities, are informed and engaged in the development of tailored solutions that reflect their specific needs and concerns.
6. Strengthens support for health services, law enforcement, and emergency responders who respond to alcohol-related harms.
7. Takes a holistic approach that empowers communities, supports families, and builds long-term, sustainable solutions to reduce alcohol-related harm in the Northern Territory.
8. Acknowledges the role of alcohol in exacerbating domestic, family and sexual violence and prioritises the safety of women and children.
9. Removes the undue influence of the alcohol lobby in the development and implementation of alcohol policy, ensuring decisions are made in the public interest and based on evidence rather than commercial interests.
10. Ensures a long-term vision and commitment to effective alcohol policy, with clear commitments and funding across electoral cycles and progress monitored through measurable outcome.

8. Select Committee on the Indigenous Employment Provisional Sum

Status: To be moved:

That a select committee to be known as the Select Committee on the Indigenous Employment Provisional Sum (IEPS) be established to inquire into and report on the Auditor-General's *November 2018 Report to the Legislative Assembly* at pages 31 to 66 in respect of the Department of Infrastructure, Planning and Logistics, including but not limited to consideration of:

- a) the full extent of overpayments to all IEPS contractors;
- b) options for repayment by contractors of all unrecovered overpayments; and

- c) in cases of *prima facie* evidence of fraud, the merits of legal proceedings based on advice from relevant government agencies.
- 1. That the committee be comprised of government, opposition and Independent members;
- 2. that the committee have the power to report to the Assembly from time to time; and
- 3. that the Committee present its final report to the Assembly on or before 31 October 2025.

9. Protecting Territorians from Gambling Harms

Notice given by: K McNamara

Date: 13 February 2025

Status: To be moved:

That the NT Legislative Assembly

- Acknowledge that gambling and pokies causes significant harm in our community.
- Recognise that the financial and social costs to our economy and community from gambling and pokies far outweigh any benefits from the Community Benefit Fund.
- Recognise that the current taxation on gambling profits is woefully inadequate.
- Calls on the CLP Government to:
 - Minimise harm from pokies by -
 - introducing pre-commitment systems to all venues with pokies, including casinos.
 - Reduce the load up limit for pokies to \$100
 - Increase transparency on the gambling industry by -
 - Reintroduce mandatory publishing of venue earnings/taxation.
 - Publish monthly venue-specific data in line with other jurisdictions.
 - Release the publicly-funded NT Gambling Prevalence and Wellbeing Survey report within a month of receipt.
 - Increase revenue for the NT and make online gambling companies pay their fair share of tax by -
 - Increase the tax on gambling corporations using NT bookmaker/betting exchange licenses
 - Remove the cap on this tax.

10. Improving Rental Security in the Northern Territory

Notice given by: K McNamara

Date: 13 February 2025

Status: To be moved:

That the NT Legislative Assembly

- Recognises the rising costs of living pressures upon Territorians, particularly renters who often face housing insecurity
- Acknowledges that renters in the NT face frequent and unreasonable rent increases
- Urges the CLP Government to improve protections for renters under the Residential Tenancies Act by:
 - Introduce a two year rent freeze
 - Limit rental increases to 2% every 2 years after end of rent freeze

- o Establishing an independent bond board, minimum standards for rental premises, including energy efficiency and heating/cooling requirements
- o Abolish no grounds evictions
- o Protect tenants against discrimination
- o Modernise the Act to reflect the realities of renting, including specific protections for renters living in sharehouses
- o Strengthen accountability for landlords obligations.

- Exploring pathways to enhance public engagement and participation in the legislative process, including through Citizens' Juries.

- Reaffirms support for the critical environmental protections the former Labor Government put in place including a contemporary *Environment Protection Act* best practice regulation for the environmental impacts of mining, the Climate Change Response: Towards 2050 policy; and The Territory Water Plan.
- Commits to not undermining watering down or changing our strong legislative and regulatory regime of environmental protections.

3. Water Security in the Northern Territory

Status: To be moved:

That the Assembly calls on the Northern Territory Country Liberal Party Government:

- Work in partnership with the Commonwealth Government to undertake an independent and comprehensive review of the Northern Territory Water Act 1992 and, where required implement legislative reforms based on scientific evidence;
- Commit to the continued implementation of priority actions identified in the Territory Water Plan, recognising that it is the Northern Territory's first whole-of-government strategic plan for water security and the result of comprehensive community and industry consultation;
- Honour the previous government's commitment and introduce the new Safe Drinking Water Act which was being developed by NT Health to be introduced to the Legislative Assembly by the end of 2024; and
- Introduce a moratorium on all new water licences and allocations in the Northern Territory until an independent review is carried out.
