East Arnhem Regional Reconstruction Committee



CONTEXT

The NT Government has announced the establishment of the Territory Economic Reconstruction Commission (the Commission) to drive the Territory economic rebound strategy. The strategy will focus in four main areas:

- 1) Securing investment to create long term jobs
- 2) Sustaining our population and the liveability of the Territory
- 3) Supporting Territory businesses to keep existing and create new jobs
- 4) Driving industry growth and our resilience in supply chains

The Commission and Team Territory Terms of Reference and Green Paper for the Commissions work are located here: <https://business.nt.gov.au/business-reforms-and-initiatives/jobs-first-an-economic-vision-for-the-territory>

The Commission will also receive advice and support from Team Territory. Team Territory is a key reference group of trusted experts that understand the criticality of Operation Rebound and who understand the unique Northern Territory context. Team Territory will be appointed for a two year period to provide specialist advice to the Commission and ensure any recommendations of the Commission are achievable and deliver real benefits to Territorians in the short, medium and long term of Operation Rebound.

To support the Commission's objectives to drive rapid and sustained economic recovery across the Territory, the Northern Territory Government is seeking a focussed effort from an East Arnhem Regional Reconstruction Committee to ensure effective regional prioritisation of initiatives and identification large and small projects and ideas which would drive investment and long term growth. Many of these initiatives may already be identified on the region's capital works program, the Regional Economic Plan or have been identified previously by the East Arnhem Regional Economic Development Committee (REDC).

To support the establishment of the Regional Reconstruction Committee (RRC), the Terms of Reference for the East Arnhem REDC are proposed to be amended for a period which may extend for up to 24 months. It is proposed that the Rebound strategy amendments should take precedence over the existing Terms of Reference to ensure focussed effort in economic rebound and the work of the Commission and subsequent implementation.

1. Objectives

To support the East Arnhem region to rebound from the economic shock of COVID-19 and build resilience and sustainability over the near to medium term through a range of priority investment attraction and enabling initiatives. The aim being to support the broad Territory objectives to:

- 1) Support the Commission and Team Territory to deliver Operation Rebound
- 2) create as many new private sector jobs as possible
- 3) deliver an average of 5% growth in Gross State Product
- 4) lift the level of private investment to above 20% of State Final Demand on a rolling 5 year basis.

2. Activities

In line with the Rebound strategy and work of the Commission, the RRC will plan, document and gain broad support for an East Arnhem regional economic Rebound Plan, incorporating priority elements of the existing East Arnhem REDC Work plan, and new and additional initiatives that:

- Informs, influences and contributes to the Territory and National economic recovery planning and implementation, including the Territory Economic Reconstruction Commission and National COVID-19 Coordination Commission;
- allows for effective Traditional Owner involvement and engagement through the Land Councils for any initiatives on Aboriginal Land;
- provides a framework and list of priority initiatives which will support coordination and monitoring of implementation of the plan.

The REDC will give special consideration to projects which ensure jobs growth and opportunity for all of the people of East Arnhem Land.

3. Membership

The RRC members may, by consensus, seek additional members, to ensure holistic business, community and traditional owner involvement in the economic rebound work. Particular consideration should be given to appropriate representation from the Groote Archipelago.

12. Meetings

Meetings will occur as often as necessary to develop and implement the East Arnhem region Rebound Plan. Initially meetings will be held no less than monthly (and could be as often as fortnightly) and include videoconferencing and other technologies to support maximum participation whilst observing COVID-19 physical distancing requirements.

13. Secretariat

The Department of the Chief Minister will coordinate and facilitate the meetings, minutes, plans and correspondence of the RRC during this period with the support of the Department of Trade, Business and Innovation's Economic Development Officer.

14. Outputs, plans, reports and deliverables

The RRC will develop an East Arnhem Rebound Plan, and associated detailed plans, for submission to the Territory Economic Reconstruction Taskforce which:

- 1) creates jobs and stimulates the regional economy in the near term
- 2) supports investment attraction to East Arnhem, including in the remote communities and homelands by consent
- 3) identifies priorities for regulatory and tax reform and streamlining approvals to support industry and investment
- 4) promotes East Arnhem region's comparative advantages and strategic location
- 5) supports engagement with the Australian Government, investors and trade partners
- 6) prioritises and identifies strategic enabling infrastructure and commercial and human services to support jobs growth and investment
- 7) identifies the workforce, population strategies and skills needed to deliver the Rebound Plan, and
- 8) identifies public and private projects, investment and initiatives which would drive investment, industry/business growth and wealth creation and distribution.

The East Arnhem Rebound Plan, and any associated action/implementation plans, will ensure that actions and responsibilities for delivery are clear, timeframes are set and there are appropriate accountability mechanisms for all stakeholders involved.

The RRC, on matters of the East Arnhem Rebound Plan, will report to Team Territory, and where necessary, advocate at the National level and with relevant Ministers and government agencies on specific matters which may require escalation to advance aspects of the agreed Plan.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

1. Objective

The aim of East Arnhem Regional Economic Development Committee (REDC) is to assist the region to grow its economic base (including the growth in Aboriginal economic participation) by providing advice to the NT Government and other stakeholders on the regional economic development needs and priorities of the region.

2. Activities

The East Arnhem REDC shall determine its own approach and initiatives to progress the objective, however in doing so, the Committee will ensure that Aboriginal communities and organisations are engaged and strongly represented in all aspects of its activities. Potential activities might include but are not limited to:

- Identifying barriers to regional and local economic development and potential solutions to these barriers.
- Developing proposals that will drive economic growth in the region, including proposals that can be undertaken both with and without direct government support.
- Promoting economic and employment growth and contributing to development and investment attraction in the region including works through the Regional Economic Development Plan.
- Identifying and prioritising regional and local economic development opportunities including those for Aboriginal people.

The content of the advice provided will also be at the committee's discretion however committee members should consider current Federal and Northern Territory government policy and programs in relation to regional economic development and related activities.

The East Arnhem REDC is a regional body and does not represent the NT Government. Advice provided to government will be considered in conjunction with other sources of information.

3. Decisions

Decisions concerning the operation of the REDC will be made by consensus of the members, by opinion or position reached by a group as a whole. If a consensus cannot be reached decisions should be made from majority vote from non-government members of the committee.

4. Membership and Appointment

The East Arnhem REDC will likely consist of at least twelve members including the Chair but depending on the level of interest could include up to 20 members.

The core or specific membership of the East Arnhem REDC will include at least one member that represents:

1. Developing East Arnhem Limited – Chief Executive Officer
2. Northern Land Council – Regional Manager
3. Chamber of Commerce NT – Chief Executive Officer or regional nominee
4. Land Management – up to two regional representatives from Ranger organisations
5. Rio Tinto – nominee
6. East Arnhem Land Tourism Association – Chairperson
7. East Arnhem Regional Council – Chief Executive Officer or nominee
8. Nhulunbuy Corporation Limited - Chief Executive Officer or nominee
9. Regional Development Australia NT – East Arnhem committee representative or nominee
10. Australian Government – National Indigenous Australian Agency – Regional Manager
11. NT Department of the Chief Minister – Regional Executive Director
12. NT Department of Trade, Business and Innovation – Regional Executive Director or delegate (and Secretariat)

Nomination or EOI processes for other positions

- Up to four nominated representatives of the Arnhem Aboriginal Business Council
- Up to three other business representatives through Expressions of Interest

Nomination for Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal business positions will be made via membership expressions of interest which includes reason why the person/organisation want to join, what they bring, and how they will contribute to regional economic development.

Except for the specified member positions in the above, general members are appointed by the NT Minister for Trade, Business and Innovation.

5. Term of appointment

Providing specified Members wish to continue to be involved in the REDC, these memberships will be maintained so long as the REDC is in existence. For nomination-based positions, membership is for a term of two years. The nominated positions will be re-advertised for application 3 months before the expiry of these memberships. There is no limit to the number of times a person may nominate for membership of the REDC.

6. Appointment of Chair

The appointment of the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson for each Committee will be for a period of 2 years and will occur through a nomination and voting process. The voting process will be conducted by secretariat via a secret ballot and will be determined by a majority consensus vote. The Chairperson and Vice Chairperson must not be a government employee. Voting will be held until a majority of Members decide the preferred nominee. The successful nominee will hold the position for a period of up to two years. If there is only one nomination, the position of Chair will be by direct appointment. When the Chair is not available or resigns the position, the Vice Chair will convene the REDC meetings until such time as the Chair returns or a new process to appoint a new Chair.

7. Resignation of Members and Termination

If a nominated member wishes to resign their appointment, they are asked to provide the Minister with a letter of resignation. The resignation takes effect on the day it is received by the Minister, or if a later date is specified in the resignation letter.

If a member fails to attend three consecutive meetings with no reasonable justification provided, the Chair through discussion with the other members may assess that member to have no further interest in the business of the REDC and recommend to NT Department of Trade, Business and Innovation via secretariat to have their membership terminated. This can include specified Members and nominated members.

8. Remuneration

There will be no remuneration for sitting fees of members. Consideration may be given in a case-by-case basis to reimburse excessive travel expenses for members. Should a member foresee excessive travel expenses as part of their appointment, this should be progressed through the secretariat at the time of appointment as a new REDC member. We encourage all members to make use of technology systems and both teleconferencing and video conferencing options will be available for most meetings.

9. Induction

All new members will receive an introduction to the workings of the REDC, their role and responsibilities and administrative arrangements. This is to ensure that REDC members are appropriately informed of their role and member expectations. The following information should be provided to new members:

- letter of appointment specifying the term of appointment and roles and responsibilities;
- a brief history of the Committee, information about current members and copies of minutes of meetings held over the last 12 months;
- a schedule of REDC meeting dates, attendance requirements and arrangements for notice of absence;
- information about the REDC's operating environment and reporting to Government and the broader community; and
- arrangements for declaring interests including conflicts of interest and NT Government policy statements affecting the REDC

10. Duties of members

The Chair:

- Leads the REDC and ensures appropriate procedures are in place for the effective functioning of the committee including an opportunity for all members to make meaningful contributions;
- Provides support and oversight of the Committee including encouraging attendance and fair and active participation;
- Represents the REDC at events and other meetings as appropriate;
- Chairs committee meetings including ensuring opportunities for agenda items from Members are made available;
- Ensures conflicts of interest are considered and if appropriate, ask members with a conflict of interest to remove themselves from relevant discussions and agenda items
- Must not be an NTG employee; and
- Does not have greater authority than other members of the REDC however may have a casting vote in situations where a vote is taken and evenly split.

Committee members must:

- Attend REDC meetings as often as possible demonstrate a strong commitment through active participation in meetings and advancing actions and initiatives where possible
- Provide reasonable explanation of absences and apologies to the Chair;
- Represent the interests of and actively champion the region, not just their own organisation's/ individual interests;

- Not make improper use of information or opportunities received through their position on the Committee;
- Promptly and accurately relay relevant information provided to the REDC to their governing groups and other interested stakeholders (such as a Board of Directors, Regional Council, senior management, Town Board etc.);
- Through Committee consensus, support and champion advice provided to relevant Government Ministers, the broader community and other stakeholders in the form of letters and reports and communiques;
- Work with REDC Members and other stakeholders in a collaborative way to support the East Arnhem region's economic growth and jobs creation;
- Declare and/or avoid actual or potential conflicts of interest between their REDC duties and their personal interests or their duties to others;
- As soon as reasonably practicable, prior to or at the beginning of the REDC meeting, Members should disclose to the REDC Chair any actual conflict of interest for agenda items to be discussed;
- Where deemed appropriate by the majority of the REDC or Chair, not take part in any discussion relating to the matters;
- Where deemed appropriate, be absent from the room when any such discussion or voting is taking place.

11. Code of Conduct

The REDC has a responsibility to manage itself in the best interests of the region it serves.

The REDC will demonstrate professional and ethical behaviour at all times in their professional relationships with each other and in service to the community and region.

Individual members of the REDC will:

- Represent the best interests of the REDC above personal and professional interests.
- Provide advice to the Minister without fear or favour and in a constructive and reasonable manner leaving personal political views aside. Members agree to maintain confidentiality regarding REDC business and agree to keep discussions on issues within the REDC membership, relevant government staff and in communications with the Minister.
- Be diligent in undertaking agreed tasks and to attend and prepare for scheduled meetings.
- Observe confidentiality relating to non-public information acquired as part of their role as an REDC member and not disclose such information to others outside of the REDC or NTG.
- Declare potential conflicts of interest and refrain from discussion and voting when applicable.
- Ensure that the independent views of all members are given due consideration and weight.
- Treat NTG staff and other REDC members with respect and listen to their points of view, and give recognition to others who contribute to the success of the committee and its activities.
- Take into consideration cultural sensitivities of members, staff and issues that the organisation may deal with.
- Do not make improper use of inside information to seek to gain a benefit or advantage for themselves or any other person.
- At all times, behave in a way that upholds the integrity and good reputation of the REDC.

Failure to abide by the Code of Conduct will be handled in a fair and reasonable manner, and will be assessed as a case-by-case basis against the Code of Conduct and the duties of members. The NT Department of Trade, Business and Innovation or delegate will assess each case and a suitable resolution sought. Dependant on the assessment, a written warning may be issued, or this might also result in removal from the REDC.

12. Meetings

The Chair of the REDC will be responsible for determining the scheduling of meetings in order to carry out its function. The suggested schedule is to meet every six (6) weeks, but the Chair in consultation with the Committee, who may decide to meet more or less regularly should it be deemed necessary, can alter this from time to time. The REDC should meet no less than four times per year.

In consultation with the REDC Chair, the Secretariat will arrange venues for REDC meetings. A quorum for a meeting will consist of over 50% of members. If a quorum is not reached, the Secretariat and Chair will make an effort to seek member attendance. If not possible, the Chair can opt to adjourn to a later time and/or date or cancel the meeting.

13. Secretariat

The NT Department of Trade, Business and Innovation's East Arnhem regional office, provides secretariat support. Secretariat duties will include:

- working with the Chair and Committee to set the agenda
- preparing and distributing meeting papers
- recording and distributing minutes and action lists arising from meetings to all members
- coordinating actions arising from meetings to ensure timeframes are met or renegotiated
- assisting the Chair in development of the Committee's reports to the Minister for Trade, Business and Innovation
- providing research assistance to the REDC and assist with the development of research papers
- Where practical, the agenda together with reports and documents that relate to the agenda will be forwarded to committee members in sufficient time to enable consideration prior to meetings.

The REDC secretariat will coordinate REDC reporting and follow up processes.

The NT Government Executive Director or senior departmental officer in the region will provide appropriate support and facilitate the two-way flow of information, ideas and requests between the REDCs and the NT Government.

14. Outputs, plans, reports and deliverables

The REDC will identify measurable targets of regional development activities, track progress against the agreed targets, and report progress on these to the Minister for Trade, Business and Innovation.

The REDC will develop a Regional Economic Development Plan with support from the secretariat. Plans are to be reviewed and updated annually.

The REDC, through the preparation of reports and correspondence by the Secretariat and Members, will report to the Chief Minister, Jobs Sub-Committee of Cabinet and Chief Executives Jobs Standing Committee and other Commonwealth Government Ministers on regional priorities. The reports and correspondence will be provided no less than 6 monthly and include areas of priority for which the REDC is seeking government action and commitment. To the extent possible, the Committee will include robust justification for a commitment from government.

The REDC may also make submissions to Parliamentary Inquiries and Committees that may be inquiring into matters of importance to the region.

The REDC Chair will seek a meeting with Chief Minister and Minister for Trade, Business and Innovation no less than annually. Ideally this meeting will be held in the region to enable other REDC Members to attend.

The Chair of the REDC will receive support from the secretariat to visit with other REDC Chairs twice a year, at least once face to face and other meetings via video conference.

The secretariat will provide a report to the Jobs Standing Committee for the Northern Territory Government after each meeting.

A short one page summary outcomes of each REDC meeting will be provided to the community and region so the work of the REDC is better understood and mechanisms for feedback clear.

15. Yolngu and Anindilyakwa Engagement

Procedures and structures will be developed to ensure the active engagement of Yolngu leaders in the REDC or in advisory roles to the REDC. This may be via the REDC Member Boards and Committees/Councils, the Arnhem Aboriginal Business Council, other regional Yolngu and Anindilyakwa organisational boards or through specific Aboriginal engagement approaches agreed by the REDC.

16. Evaluation and review

The NT Government will evaluate the performance of the REDC every two years from the date of the establishment of the Committee and engage with the REDC in preparing its reports. The aim being to support constant improvement of the REDC's efforts to growth the region's economy. The review will include a sharing of good initiatives and approaches from other REDCs from across the NT.
