The suspension figures are the total number of individual suspensions for the year. A
student may be suspended on more than one occasion during the year. Reasons for
suspension are far-ranging and can include uniform violation through to more serious
matters such as swearing at or threatening teachers, as well as a range of physical
contact.

- In 2011/2012, the Department of Education and Training (DET) undertook an Extreme Behaviours review which encouraged teachers to be more aware of reporting requirements relating to incidents in schools. It was anticipated that this would lead to an increase in reporting assaults against teachers as serious.
- Teachers have a range of supports provided to assist in such situations. These
 include a new training program to assist teachers to de-escalate volatile situations,
 professional learning in behaviour management and specialist behaviour advisory
 support. DET provides a free counselling service through Employee Assistance
 Services Australia for all staff.
