ANSWER:

(a) – (e) Due to the significant administrative effort required to provide a detailed breakdown of advertising and communications costs, DCF has provided an overview of its communications and marketing activities for the period.

DCF's total expenditure for advertising and communications for the period 1 July 2024 to 31 March 2025 was \$76,737. Due to additional Machinery of Government processes, it is an administrative burden to provide amounts accurately from 24 August 2024.

This expenditure includes expenses such as:

- printing of collateral (for example posters, flyers and banners);
- event costs (for example, venue hire and merchandise);
- advertising fees (for example print, radio, online and social media);
- graphic design materials (for example design of promotional materials or infographics explaining processes and systems to community and stakeholders); and
- administrative costs (such as subscriptions to media outlets and marketing software).

As a frontline agency, DCF has wide-ranging requirements for advertising and communications. These can be broadly categorised as:

- promoting available grants to the sector and public;
- promoting opportunities for communities to 'have your say';
- advertising critical vacancies;
- promoting available services, programs and events to the public;
and
- communicating rights and responsibilities to our client base.

Marketing services are internally provided where possible however, graphic design and photography were largely outsourced due to the late 2024 Machinery of Government changes resulting in staff with those skills transitioning to new departments. All advertising is booked through the approved Northern Territory Government provider, Atomic 212.

The primary media channel for DCF's advertising spend is the NT News and regional radio. Notable advertising campaigns for this period included the 16 Days of Activism and #SafeFestiveSeason Domestic, Family Sexual Violence prevention (DFSV) campaign.

Notable marketing and communications activities for the period 1 July 2024 to 31 March 2025, included \$37,514 invested in recruitment marketing and communications and a further \$39,222 across:

- Annual foster and kinship carer celebrations and video development.
- 16 Days of Activism social media campaign promoting community organisations and individuals working to prevent and reduce domestic, family and sexual violence.
- Safe Holiday Season campaign rolling out across social media, out of home advertising in shopping centres and regional radio.
- Community events including the DFSV Community BBQ.
